The Gift of Hearing

As a HOH Board member, I was made aware of a sponsored child, Camila, who was born with a significant hearing impairment in both ears. When it came time to upgrade my hearing aids, the audiologist informed me that many people donate their functional, previously used hearing aids. In discussing Camila's situation with the audiologist, he volunteered to assist in refurbishing and calibration of the hearing aids. Unfortunately, Covid created delays that would last 3 years. Finally, in early February of this year, we were able to visit the DR to review the good work that is being done by our leadership in the DR. I took the hearing aids and showed Camila how to wear, adjust, and use them. It was an amazing experience seeing her reaction to hearing the world around her that she had never heard before. It will take time to adjust from lip reading, particularly in school and other social settings, but I am confident she will do fantastic. I'm thankful for the assistance of Costco; particularly Jeff, the audiologist;

Sharla, her sponsor, for purchasing many batteries, and for the blessing of being able to meet and assist Camila in person. Her life will forever be changed.

Imagine being 10 years old and never getting the chance to go to school. We couldn't fathom this in the United States as we pride ourselves as one of the most educated countries in the world.

In reality, many kids in the Dominican Republic and around the world live without the opportunity of education. Our teachers had a case recently where a 10-year-old child had no formal education. The reason being he was an undocumented Haitian child and you need documentation to enter school. He was born in the DR but due to political situations he was considered Haitian because at least one of his parents was Haitian.

Our teachers welcomed him into our programs and helped him learn. It turned out this was a very bright child who caught on quickly. The teacher also encouraged the parents to get the child documentation so he could go to the public school. When the parents received the documentation for the child, he was tested and immediately placed above his standard grade level. Amazing!!! Going from no school to above grade level in a matter of a year.

This child wasn't a sponsor child but due to the might of the overall sponsorship program we were able to give the gift of education to another child.

The conversations, fun, and selflessness experienced were some of the best moments of the trip. This will happen better at a place we call our own.
